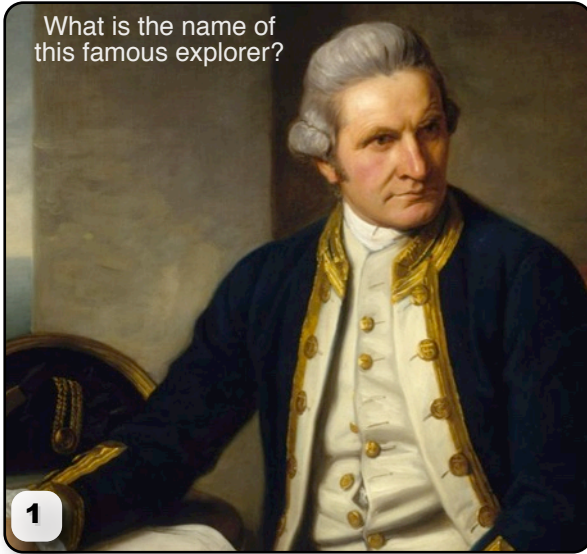

Weekly Quiz - Answers

1. Who did Scott Morrison say was behind the February 8 hacking of the Liberal, Labor and National party computers?
b. a foreign government - The Prime Minister said intelligence points towards a foreign government being responsible for the hacking but he didn't say who. He also said investigations into the recent hack were yet to find any evidence of electoral interference.
2. Woolworths has announced it will no longer sell milk for \$1 per litre. How much will it charge for milk?
b. \$1.10 a litre - The price will increase by 10 cents per litre which will go directly to drought stricken dairy farmers. Woolworths have not ruled out future price rises to help farmers. The NSW Farmers Association is calling for other retailers to follow suit.
3. A British teenager who fled London when she was 15-yrs-old to join a terrorist group, is not being allowed to return to Britain. Which terrorist group did she join?
b. ISIS - The school girl who fled four years ago to join ISIS in Syria, now says she wants to go back to Britain to raise her son. Her family has just been sent papers saying her British citizenship has been cancelled.
4. Dozens of ships have been stalled off the coast of China due to import restrictions in the country. What Australian goods are being carried on these vessels?
a. coal - Beijing have imposed import restrictions to boost their domestic coal prices, with no indication of when they might be lifted. Australia's biggest exports to China are iron ore and coal, worth \$120b (or 30pc of goods sold overseas).
5. Last week Donald Trump confirmed his plans to "declare" what?
a. a state of emergency - Trump has announced that he is declaring an emergency so he could get more money for his wall with Mexico than Congress had authorised.
6. True or false, a recent dental report has found that 70 per cent of Australians brush their teeth twice a day?
False - Only 51 per cent of Australians brush their teeth twice a day. The Oral Health Tracker also found adults aged 18 to 35 and women were more likely to feature in the 51 per cent of adults who brush their teeth twice a day, with brushing habits dropping off as people aged.
7. Which band's bass player, known as Flea, performed impressive handstands to entertain a Hobart crowd during a 20 minute power cut last week?
b. Red Hot Chili Peppers - The Californian group Red Hot Chili Peppers were halfway through their second song of the evening in Hobart, when the power was cut to their sound system. The 56 yr-old bassist Flea (who was actually born in Melbourne), found a way of entertaining the crowd.
8. What is NSW doing to help young people struggling with bullying and stress?
c. they will be introducing two mental health staff to every public high school - NSW is introducing a multi-million dollar package for a reported 350 student support officers and 100 additional full-time counsellors or qualified psychologists in high schools.
9. The European Union are making moves to protect the names Feta, Edam and Parmesan. What are they all types of?
c. cheese - The European Union (EU) are considering a ban on labelling cheese Feta, Edam or Parmesan. The EU believes that like Champagne, certain foods are special and unique to the region they come from.
10. Personalised Plates Queensland have announced from next month drivers will be able to ...?
b. add emojis to their license plates - The smartphone symbols won't be included in registration numbers and are simply decorative. To begin with, there will be a choice of just five standard symbols available. They include the laugh out loud, a winking face emoji, a cool sunglasses emoji, heart eyes and the standard smiling face emoji.

12. Why was Perth's Quinns Beach in the news last week?
b. a shark was spotted on the wrong side of the beach's protective shark net - The net was installed in January 2017, by Global Marine Enclosures. Just four months ago Middleton Beach on Western Australia's south coast, was closed when a shark was spotted inside netting installed by the same company.
13. Which company released a two-in-one smartphone tablet that folds in the middle?
a. Samsung - When it's folded it has a 4.6 inch display but when the device opens up it has a large 7.3 inch display that essentially transforms the phone into a tablet.
14. Qantas has announced that by 2021 the airline wants to become the first airline in the world to ...?
c. reuse, recycle and compost at least 75 per cent of its waste - Single-use plastics will be replaced with alternative packaging, old crew uniforms will be recycled, more food will be composted or donated and boarding passes will go digital as part of the changes.
15. Why have authorities in the remote Russian Novaya Zemlya islands, declared a state of emergency?
c. there has been an influx of polar bears and they have started entering homes - Authorities in the remote Russian Arctic islands, have declared a state of emergency after dozens of polar bears began entering homes and buildings, and attacking people. Climate change has been blamed for the frequency and large number of the bears in the area.

1. **Captain Cook** - New Zealand has organised activities to mark the 250th anniversary of Captain Cook first landing in that country. He sailed three voyages to the South Pacific ocean, mapping the east coast of Australia, New Zealand and several Pacific islands.
2. **Bishop** - Julie Bishop has announced she will retire from federal parliament at the election. She was Australia's first female foreign minister. In that role she travelled constantly and was a popular figure on the international stage.
